Rationale

Our core values are friendship, optimism and hard work. Wellbeing is privileged within our school community and we wish for every pupil to become a happy, successful and productive member of society. We recognise and appreciate the influential role that parents, carers, staff, governors and professionals play in the lives of our pupils and acting as a role model is an essential element of what we do. In addition to our everyday interactions, discrete teaching of knowledge and skills is essential for personal development.

Curriculum

The government's Relationships Education, Relationships and Sex Education (RSE) and Health Education curriculum became compulsory from September 2020 and all schools should begin teaching the new objectives by the start of the summer term 2021.

In our setting, class teachers will teach the majority of the new curriculum through Personal, Social and Health Education (PSHE) lessons. We will follow the PSHE Association's programme builders to ensure that our lesson content is up-to-date and covers the Department for Education's objectives. Staff will receive updates and training from the PSHE lead teacher to ensure safe and effective practice. Lessons will be considerate of the age and ability of the pupils.

Right to Withdraw

Parents and carers will continue to have the right to withdraw their child from sex education which, unless there are exceptional circumstances, should be granted up to three terms before their child turns 16. At this point, if the child wishes to receive sex education rather than be withdrawn, the school should make arrangements for this to happen in one of the three terms before the child turns 16.

Consideration should be given to the social and emotional effects of being excluded from lessons as well as the likelihood of the child hearing their peers' version of what has been taught by the teacher.

N.B. It is not a requirement for sex education to be taught in primary schools. The relationships and health aspects of the curriculum are compulsory for all pupils.
